Photographic iconography: Architecture and the City

Program

The course provides an exploration of the development of architectural photography, from the earliest examples of the genre in the nineteenth century to today. The narration will proceed both according to a chronological direction and by themes, such as: the effects of photography on both architectural practice and historiography; the diffusion of colour photography; the use of digital photography in the communication of space; the impact of aerial and satellite imagery in the contemporary perception of architecture.
